HVN - CHANGES AFOOT!

You will recall that we published a short survey to find out what residents thought about the Village News and whether we should make any changes to its format or frequency. Thank you to those who took the time to respond to the survey. Only 1% of recipients of the newsletter responded, which may reflect a lack of interest. Most respondents were over 65 years old, which suggests that the newsletter in its current format does not reach younger residents. Most would be happy to collect a copy so distribution by our team of volunteers is unnecessary.

As a result of the feedback the Parish Council has decided that the February 2018 issue (*i.e. this one*) is the last one in the current quarterly format delivered to all homes.

We will switch to a monthly newsletter, principally in electronic format, accessible from the Parish Council website. We are investigating setting up an automatic email delivery for residents to sign up for. For those without access to IT, we will continue to print some hard copies for distribution to selected village service centres (*such as the library, village hall and medical centre*) for collection. We also wish to ensure that all those who are unable to collect a copy or read one online can still have a copy delivered to their home. If you need a copy delivered please let us know, and depending on the level of response we will try to make arrangements.

We continue to welcome suggestions from residents regarding the content in our communications and we will keep to format and distribution under review.

Have you, or a Loved One, been Affected by Cancer?



If so, health and care services in Buckinghamshire would like your help to ensure they are delivering the best possible care for the population – which means it is vital to hear from residents who have experienced cancer treatment.

NHS Aylesbury Vale and NHS Chiltern Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) are working with Macmillan Cancer Support to invite people with experience of cancer to give their views in a new online survey.

Everyone's experience of cancer is different. So, in order to give the best possible care and support, help the CCGs to understand what that looks like to you and how you think they should provide it.

Because you have been through it, you are best placed to say what works, what can be improved, and what specific cancer support should be available to you within the Bucks area.

Haddenham Community Library

The Vale Lottery

Lotteries are a fun and effective way for causes to raise much-needed funds in these difficult times. By getting more people on board, they don't just raise funds, they also raise awareness.

The Vale Lottery is a weekly lottery that directly supports good causes which benefit the Aylesbury Vale community. 50% of ticket sales support your chosen good cause, whilst 10% is added into a general good cause fund, administered by Aylesbury Vale District Council, which will be spent on providing vital support to a wide range of local organisations. So, whereas 28% of National Lottery ticket sales supports good causes, 60% of Vale Lottery sales support local good causes. Tickets are only £1 each and each ticket has a 1 in 50 chance to win a prize each week, with a top prize of £25,000 and other prizes available down to £25

Horried by Blue Planet's Coverage of the Plastics Epidemic?

Do you ever wonder what happens to the things you put in your waste bin? Your recycling is sorted and passed onto recycling companies, but what about your non-recyclable waste?

All of the residual (*non-recyclable*) household waste generated in Buckinghamshire is now processed at the Greatmoor Energy from Waste facility, at Woodham, near Aylesbury. Greatmoor is operated by FCC Environment, in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council.

Greatmoor has the capacity to treat up to 300,000 tonnes of waste a year (*approximately 900 tonnes a day*), waste which would otherwise have gone to landfill. As a result, it generates a minimum of 22 megawatts of electricity to the national grid – meeting the energy needs of around 36,000 homes.

This alternative treatment of waste will result in a saving to Buckinghamshire County Council of approximately £150 million over the 30 year life of the contract.

Greatmoor is holding four public open tour days in 2018.

These are on the following Saturdays - March 17th, June 30th, September 22nd and November 24th.

On each day there will be tours, at 10.00am, 12.30pm and 3pm. Please note that places are available on a strictly booking in advance basis only. There is a minimum age limit of 12 on open tours.

Alternatively, if you belong to a local group then guided tours of Greatmoor are available for 5-15 visitors, by prior agreement and at no charge. A group visit to Greatmoor can be tailored to your requirements and will include a tour around the facility, which includes the control room (*where you will be able to see the cranes loading the waste*), a visit to the viewing hatch providing an exciting view into the heart of the fire, the turbine hall and the huge condenser fans, which is an experience not to be missed.

It's a great opportunity for residents to see the plant in operation and find out how it helps us reduce the environmental impact of our waste while at the same time saving money.

It's Pothole Season!

The condition of local roads, and the generous quantity of potholes is a regular concern for village residents. Pothole repair, and road repairs more generally are the responsibility of Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB), although the Parish Council Clerk and Councillors often report issues which they notice themselves or which are mentioned by residents.

The worst conditions for roads are when the ground temperature fluctuates constantly between just above and just below zero. Pothole formation is accelerated by this 'freeze-thaw' effect, whereby moisture gets into small cracks in the road surface and expands when it freezes, then thaws out when the temperature rises. This process repeats until the road surface begins to break up and potholes are formed.

On average, when there are no severe weather issues, TfB repairs over 4,000 potholes every month. This number clearly increases in winter months when freezing weather makes things worse.

BCC says "TfB will investigate every pothole reported to them – the worst ones will be attended to first, as a matter of urgency. But we need members of the public to report them to us either using the online form (<http://www.transportforbucks.net/report-it-pothole.aspx>), which only takes a few minutes, or by calling if it's dangerous or an emergency on 01296 382416 or 486630 (*out of hours*)."

Pothole FAQ:

You fixed one pothole, why didn't you fix the one next to it while you were here?

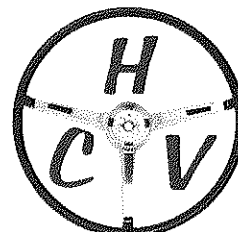
Potholes are prioritised according to risk – if they are on very well used roads, they are more of a priority. Size and depth are also factors. Resources have to be used responsibly, and cannot be used up fixing a more minor road surface defect when there are more urgent defects needing attention just up the road.

Why can I only report one pothole online at a time?

Our online reporting system works on an interactive map, so that each individual defect can be risk assessed and dealt with on a case by case basis. The map allows for accurate pinpointing, which saves time when it comes to inspections. There are drop-down menus to allow you to input as much detail, such as size and position, as possible.

Why do you make temporary repairs that don't last?

Temporary repairs, where the pothole is filled in with hot material and made smooth, are often carried out as a safety measure when a permanent repair cannot be carried out at that moment, likely due to the location of the defect. That is to say, where a larger area of road needs to be cut away to make a full repair, likely requiring a road or lane closure, a temporary or 'make safe' repair is an effective way of keeping the road safe in the meantime.

- Prevent damage to verges

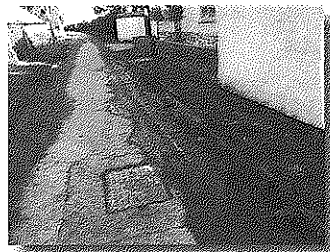
You will have noticed that the car park has re-opened operating a new one-way system. Entry to the site is via Banks Road and exit is via Churchway. A drop off zone at the front of the Village Hall is also now clearly marked.

Please note this car park is for users of the on site facilities; the village hall, library, dentist, gym and scout & guide centre. We would encourage everyone to walk or cycle to the site if they can. At peak times it will never be possible to provide sufficient car parking for everyone.

We ask for all users' assistance with making the new system work.

Verges

The Parish Council is very concerned about damage to verges at many locations around the village caused by inconsiderate driving and parking. Haddenham is a rural village with much valued green spaces which many people are sad to see being destroyed due to a lack of care.



Residents have been asking the Parish Council what can be done. Unfortunately, very little can be done once the damage has occurred. We have had some success in the past with the use of bollards and large rocks, but we cannot do this everywhere. In the end we must all take responsibility for looking after our environment so please help us to keep our village a special place.

Community Orchard - Easter Egg Hunt

Rural Crime Update

Reports of rural crime in the Thames Valley have increased by five percent between October 2016 and September 2017. However, Assistant Chief Constable Nikki Ross says "I would like to reassure members of our rural communities of my commitment to investigating reports of rural crime. We rely on information from our local communities and take such reports very seriously. Incidents are robustly investigated by our local policing teams who have dedicated Rural Crime and Wildlife Officers based across the Thames Valley."

Rural crime can take many different forms including burglary, robbery, theft, criminal damage, fly tipping, poaching and hare coursing. We are continuing to work with local residents, businesses and partners to raise awareness of crime prevention techniques while developing problem solving solutions to tackle rural crime.

There are often fewer witnesses to rural crimes and greater opportunities for criminals to target isolated properties and businesses. The impact of these crimes can also be greater, with people feeling more vulnerable due to their remote location.

You can reduce the risk of becoming a victim of rural crime by taking a few simple steps including:

- Keeping the boundaries of your land and property well-maintained and secure
- Fitting strong locks to sheds, garages and outbuildings
- Checking security equipment regularly to ensure it is working properly
- Locking equipment away in a secure building when it's not in use
- Security marking your tools and equipment

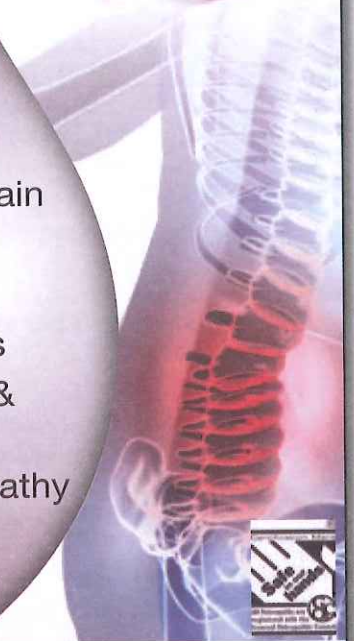
