EDITORIAL

Welcome to the June edition of the Neighbourhood Newsletter. Firstly some good news PC Kingham & PCSO Jones have been awarded Neighbourhood Officer and PCSO of the year for Bucks. I am sure you will all join me in congratulating them on this award which was well deserved by both of them (See the main story below). Many thanks to those of you who nominated them. Over the next few months we will be looking at the way the NAG works and how we can improve its performance and accessibility to the community. The first step is to trial a link with the Local Area forum with the NAG twice a year, this will enable more people to have a say in what the NAG tackles and to develop greater links with the wider community. We will also be reviewing the priorities monthly to make sure we are targeting the correct issues. This will enable us to be more proactive in targeting offences and offenders and reacting to changes in circumstances. We will keep you updated on how this progresses.

Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG)

The NAG chairs Mark and Stewart will be meeting with the team over the next few weeks making arrangements for the next meeting and how we can look at improving the differences for the community that we completed last year.

The next NAG meeting is a joint meeting with the Local Area Forum and will be at 6.30pm on Wednesday 30th June, at the Ickford Village Hall, Bridge Road, Ickford.

Speed Enforcement

I have been out with the Laser Gun over the last month, and we have also had some help from the Local Roads Policing Team from Aylesbury. Enforcement in Chearsley resulted in 4 drivers receiving 3 points and a £60 fine for driving 40mph plus, in a 30mph limit; I have also issued 1 ticket on the Worminghall Road, Oakley.

Approximately 15 vehicles were stopped and spoken to about their manner of driving. Although they were driving at over 30mph, their speed was not within the limits of being issued a ticket. They would have been driving at less than 35mph.

Stolen Vehicle and Arrests in Brill

On Thursday 27th May at approximately 6.40pm there was a report, from a resident, of a car accident in Temple Street, Brill. It was reported that some of the occupants from the vehicle had run off from the scene. Quick

thinking residents took hold of a female who had tried to also run off from the scene.

Within minutes a police dog unit had arrived and the female was arrested. The vehicle had been reported stolen earlier in the day and other persons were seen running away.

Local residents very soon called up and informed the police that there was one male seen near the Windmill. This male was arrested. With the further good information given by local residents that two males, matching the other offenders descriptions, were sitting in the youth shelter next to Brill School, PCSO Sue Jones used her local knowledge in helping to direct officers, and shortly after 8pm the last two males were arrested and all taken to Oxford Custody.

We are awaiting the final outcome of this incident and will report it in next month's newsletter.

Neighbourhood Policing Awards 2010!!

A Neighbourhood Specialist Officer and a Police Community Support Officer (PCSO), both based on the Haddenham and Long Crendon Neighbourhood, have been named among Thames Valley Police's Community Officers of the year.

PC Dean Kingham, who has only been in his post for 17 months, was awarded the Buckinghamshire Community Police Officer of the Year Award for helping the local neighbourhood tackle neighbourhood priorities and for the trust and respect he has built up with residents of all ages and all cultures.

Dean has actively helped to tackle the main issue of excessive speed by vehicles in the villages, issuing over 100 Fixed Penalty Notices (FPNs) to drivers, and residents have seen a noticeable difference with drivers driving with more care and at a reduced speed

through their villages. All the nominations Dean received mentioned his regular patrols and visits around the neighbourhood and his excellent relationship with the community, including residents, local children, local businesses and parish council members.

Dean has been credited with changing attitudes in the community, and is regarded as a problem-solver, tackling a wide range of issues in the area, including, providing support to elderly people and education and awareness to local children, tackling any anti-social behaviour. He also works closely with the countryside residents to help tackle rural crime including poaching.

PC Kingham said: "I feel proud and privileged to receive this award. I would like to thank my team, partner agencies, and the community for their support and encouragement over the past 17 months. This award means even more knowing that I have been nominated by members of the public and those I work alongside; neighbourhood policing has made me feel that what I'm doing is making a real difference."

PCSO Sue Jones has been named PCSO of the year in Buckinghamshire for the work and support she provides to the local schools and youth centre. Sue has addressed the local priorities of parking, road safety and anti-social behaviour with frequent patrols during school pick up times, dealing with any parking or congestion problems and finding solutions to suit everyone. Sue makes regular visits to the young people giving talks and advice on road safety and what anti-social behaviour is and how it can affect local residents.

Sue has also worked as a key part of a School Travel Plan at a local school, by attending meetings with partners and offering her support. As a result the local school has been awarded its fourth Travel Plan Award, where the links with the local community and PCSO Sue Jones were highlighted.

The award also recognises the strong community relationships she has built with residents, local children, partner agencies and local businesses. Sue carries out regular patrols in the villages providing a visible presence to all, and helps to provide reassurance, crime prevention advice, crime awareness and education to children. She has helped improve the public's and local children's confidence in the police with her presence in the community and with her enthusiasm, commitment and dedication to make a difference and improve the quality of life for everyone in the neighbourhood.

A pupil at Ickford School who nominated Sue said: "Sue Jones is like a friend to Ickford School. She is approachable, friendly and is always ready to listen. She always listens to the different points of view and speaks in a way that our younger pupils understand."

PCSO Jones said: "I was very pleased to hear that both Dean and I had been nominated for this award and would just like to thank all of those who voted for us. We are fortunate to work with such a lovely, supportive community and blessed that you feel the same. Working as a PCSO in the Haddenham and Long Crendon District has been the most rewarding and satisfying job I have had, so my thanks to you all."

Neighbourhood Insp Emma Garside, said: "Both Dean and Suzan should feel very proud of their outstanding achievements and the excellent relationships they have built with the people in their neighbourhood. The award winners are voted for by the community and other team members, which recognises the hard work that both Dean and Suzan have carried out to make Buckinghamshire safer."
