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ANGER AS HADDENHAM NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN HOUSING POLICIES QUASHED

In a shock decision Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) has abandoned the defence of the Haddenham Neighbourhood Plan (NP) at a Judicial Review in the High Court brought by Lightwood Strategic. Shortly before the hearing AVDC made a deal with Lightwood Strategic to quash the Housing and Development policies in chapter 6 of the NP.

In a late tactical move Lightwood Strategic submitted an additional witness statement based on tape recordings made during the November public inquiry into their Aston Road planning application, when volunteers who had carried out the NP site assessments were subjected to gruelling cross examination. The Parish Council's own legal team advised the Judicial Review was winnable. But the PC is only an "interested party"; the principal defendant is AVDC. The PC was informed by AVDC that they were going to agree to a Consent Order to avoid the risk of losing if the case were to go to court. The PC was in no position to continue to contest the case – not least because whereas AVDC costs, if they lost, were capped by law at £35,000, the risk to the PC could be a six figure sum without upper limit. It was with great reluctance that the Parish Council had to therefore agree to sign the Consent Order that quashes chapter 6 of the NP.

AVDC's failure in 2014 to deliver a Local Plan, its failure to have a 5 year housing land supply (with the resultant potential loss of £1.38m worth of New Homes Bonus), and now its choosing to make a deal with a hostile developer, all leaves Haddenham with no protection against aggressive developers taking advantage of the Vale's policy vacuum.

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How is the Parish Council spending your money. Update on Sheerstock Parking. Accident at Clays Corner Cross Roads. Annual Haddenham Fete. Open for Business. The Community Library. New Community Vehicle. Haddenham Museum Reopens. Heartbeat Haddenham. So what happens next? We await the outcome of the public inquiry into the Lightwoods application which is being determined by the Secretary of State, but our principal objection of conflicting with a made NP will no longer apply. The PC is seeking a meeting with the Diocese of Oxford for clarification of their statement that they will not sell their part of the site to Lightwood. Lightwood is not a builder, and once planning permission is granted, the Diocese can sell to any party to realise development. The PC will seek confirmation that the Diocese's stated "aim is always to work with the Parish and District Council to ensure the best use of the land for everyone involved" still holds true.

The PC will also seek to ensure that what has happened here cannot be done to other communities. In his Report on the NP in May 2015, Independent Examiner, Nigel McGurk BSc (Hons) MCD MBA MRTPI commented:

"I am mindful that neighbourhood planners, by their very nature, tend not to be professional planners. There are examples – especially in neighbourhood planning - of where the "experts," whether planners, lawyers or other practising professionals, have failed to properly grasp legislation. Given this, it would seem unreasonable to expect neighbourhood planners to get everything right all of the time. Most of us are human and we make mistakes. However, such mistakes need not prove fatal to the progress of a neighbourhood plan. Crucially, with regards to all of the above, it is the Independent Examiner's role to consider whether or not the Neighbourhood Plan meets the Basic Conditions" [and he found that the HNP did so].

The PC calls for urgent action by Government to prevent a situation where developers with deep pockets can employ lawyers to comb Neighbourhood Plans for the inevitable minor errors and oversights as the Independent Examiner described, and then pursue unrelenting legal action until the will or financial ability of communities to defend those plans is exhausted. NPs were intended to be an accessible process for volunteers to get involved in planning. Our experience surely cannot have been what Government intended.

The Parish Council has budgeted to revise our NP in 2016/17. The Government does not have a clear process yet for reviewing NPs, but this is something the PC is pursuing along with other parish and town councils. It seems likely we will need to go to referendum again. What is obvious is that professional help will be required to deliver a revised plan. Why would volunteers ever want to put themselves in the position of having their hours of work torn apart, their reputations questioned and in the end defeated by a developer with the incentive of huge financial gains and no interest in the people or the places they destroy?

What happens next also depends on the publication this Spring of AVDC's much delayed draft Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP). Just before Christmas, AVDC consulted on its "Issues & Options" report, a key document setting out AVDC's latest thinking on housing and employment needs across the District plus options for growth. The timetable for producing VALP is tight, and is under Government scrutiny, with final adoption due in mid- 2017. What could it mean for Haddenham?

- Firstly on housing numbers: AVDC has revised its estimate of housing need in the District from 21,000 to at least 31,000 new homes by 2033, with every possibility of yet further increase. Based on the earlier figure, as advised by AVDC, our Neighbourhood Plan (NP) allowed for 430 new homes.
- Secondly, AVDC has proposed a settlement hierarchy, with those at the top taking the lion's share of development. At the top are 5 "strategic settlements" including Haddenham the others are Aylesbury, Buckingham, Wendover & Winslow. The Parish Council has responded that Haddenham, whilst clearly more sustainable than larger villages, should not be in the same league as the market towns as we lack both a central retail core and a secondary school, and we have the built form, function and characteristics of a village not a town.
- Thirdly, AVDC has proposed nine different broad-brush options for growth, without being site specific at this stage. But as a strategic settlement, Haddenham looks in line to take 800-900 homes whatever the option, and more than advised when writing our NP.
- Finally, AVDC has commissioned a feasibility study into new and extended settlements. Buckinghamshire County Council's response to AVDC's report says that Haddenham should be the basis of an extended settlement, second only after Aylesbury for future growth.

Using professional consultants, the PC intends to draft a new housing and development chapter, with any other updates to other chapters as needed. The PC has also set up a new Committee to focus on sport, leisure and recreation, including building a new sports facility on the airfield. Do you know all the activities in the library? Regular group activities are flourishing, including the Bridge Club on Monday and Tuesday evenings, the Knit and Natter on Tuesday mornings and spinning on Thursdays. Eve McLaughlin has a run another popular Ancestry course. The Village Society held its AGM in the library and was packed out. For young people there is Bounce and Rhyme (under 5s) on Friday mornings and Craft and Lego clubs on Saturday. The defibrillator is just outside the entrance and the food bank dropoff just inside. The library's partnership with Haddenham Screen works well, to mutual advantage.

February saw National Library Day when the library was buzzing, with an offer of coffee and cake. March 3rd was World Book Day, when school groups (and some staff!) showed off their fancy dress in favourite book characters.

The Community Library is run by a committee of local Trustees with funding from Buckinghamshire County Council. However, the Grant from central government is being reduced year on year and the County has no alternative but to make cuts to many services. The County has a statutory duty to provide a 'comprehensive and efficient library service', but the county library service will have a reduced book fund, reduce mobile libraries and will be making Aylesbury library self-service. A project team led by Dr Hugh Stradling worked for over a year to raise funds and acquire the vehicle. The service, launched at the start of November, initially covers the areas served by Haddenham Medical Centre. The specially adapted VW Caddy vehicle is driven by a team of trained volunteer drivers. A small charge is made for journeys, but it is hoped that most of the running costs will be covered by sponsorship, grants and further charitable donations.

Haddenham Museum reopens

The village museum, in the Old Schoolroom behind the Methodist Church in the High St, reopens at the beginning of March after its winter break. It is open on Tuesday mornings and Sunday afternoons and welcomes visits from individuals, families and groups - for example the village primary schools visit each year in connection with their school topics.

As well as its permanent collection of books, maps and photographs the museum has changing displays from time to time. The next one will focus on village locations featured in episodes of Midsomer Murders-well worth a look!

The museum has digital screens showing old films of the airfield and the Haddenham Mummers, as well as some old films of village events. A new plasma screen has been installed to show the collection of tailor-made DVDs. One of the museum's real treasures is the 1820 map, showing all the owners and occupiers of each piece of land at the time.

The museum is staffed by a rota of volunteer stewards and new stewards are always welcome. 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The Haddenham Chronicles

JMW Turner, one of the world's greatest landscape painters, died in 1851, the year of the Great Exhibition at the Crystal Palace. His life has been covered in the last two years by the film Mr Turner and a new Turner gallery in Margate where he lived from 1833 until his death, when not living in a flat in Chelsea. Sophia Booth was his 'housekeeper', the wife of a bargeman who died soon after she met Turner. Sophia was ten years younger than Turner and they lived together as man and wife (Mr and Mrs Booth) until Turner's death. When the lease on the Chelsea flat expired in 1867, Sophia came to live at Haddenham Hall and when she died in 1878 she was buried in Margate.

The story of their relationship and the various puzzles involved in it and their finances was described by John Davis in the first issue of The Haddenham Chonicles. Since it is now ten years since the Chronicles first appeared, it is fitting to remind ourselves of one of the earliest articles. In Chronicles 2, Nigel Viney followed up the story by describing the time when he lived in Haddenham Hall.

The Haddenham Chronicles, with articles covering local people and events over hundreds of years, are published each year by the Haddenham Museum Trust and are on sale in the museum, Blooming Fruity and the Community Library. There are thirteen issues available, together with an index of articles and authors; the next one including part two of Diana Gulland's article about the Basque and Jewish refugees at Tythrop in the 1930s will be launched at the May Day celebrations on Church Green on Saturday 7 May. 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How is the Parish Council spending your money?

You will be aware of the major cut-backs in town hall spending at the same time as parish and town councils are being urged to assume new responsibilities and new ways of working. Starting in 2015/16 Haddenham Parish Council (HPC) has been taking a more forward-thinking approach to how it sets its budgets. In particular it has initiated a new set of Reserve Funds to ensure that money is available to maintain or replace the Parish's assets when required.

One example of a new reserve that has been set up is to maintain our village ponds. Last year HPC had to use money from the Contingency Reserve Fund to remove the sludge from Rudds Pond and carry out repairs to the banks of Church End Pond. This means in the next financial year we have to replace those reserves; a big expense in a single year. The new Pond Repairs Reserve Fund prevents any repetition by setting aside a small amount each year. So when the pond needs dredging again in 20 years' time the funds will be there to do so.

A similar reserve fund is being set aside to replace our aging street light columns over the next 15 years. Today 82% of the columns are either over their anticipated useful life of 30 years, or the lamps are mounted on poles which will need to be replaced. The columns have to be regularly inspected to ensure they are structurally sound and safe. These inspections drive the replacement programme with Franklin Road being one of the first streets to now have new columns with LED lanterns.

As well as setting up these new reserves the Parish Council has had additional financial responsibilities placed upon it by other bodies. Last year Bucks County Council (BCC) devolved responsibility to parishes for cutting the grass verges and some other highway maintenance tasks such as hedge cutting, cleaning road signs and dealing with flyposting. BCC devolved this responsibility because the severe cuts in its funding mean that it does not have resources to carry out this non-essential (i.e. no safety requirement for it) maintenance. In 2016/17 BCC will only be carrying out 4 cuts of the verges in parishes that didn't take up the devolution offer. Haddenham's devolution agreement is sufficient to funding 6 cuts a year. The PC has decided to increase this to 10 cuts because of the lengthening growing season in recent years. The cost of the additional 4 cuts has to be met by the PC. With capping by central government and the complete removal of central grant funding, BCC anticipates needing to devolve more duties to the Parish in the coming year along with the financial burden that entails.

We also heard from the Church that the Churchyard will be full and closed to new burials from November 2016. The Church has used its right to ask the PC to take on responsibility for the maintenance of a closed churchyard which the PC has agreed to do. The alternative was to allow AVDC to take care of this, and the village residents would have been charged a special item by them for this. A new budget has been set up for this new responsibility.

The closure of the Churchyard also means that Haddenham needs a new burial ground. It also means that the Parish Council has to become an active Burial Authority. Land needs to be acquired and a site prepared, so budget provision has been made to enable a start to be made.

The last year has seen also an unexpectedly high expenditure on legal fees to instruct barristers to represent the Parish Council at the Public Inquiry into the Lightwood Strategic planning application at Aston Road. This expenditure was required because AVDC's Strategic Management Development Committee voted in favour of the application with the result that AVDC's own legal team spoke at the Inquiry in favour of the planning application in support of the applicants. The PC also had to instruct barristers to advise on defending the application for Judicial Review of the Neighbourhood Plan. These costs ate into the reserves which now need to be replenished, and a future 'fighting fund' set up.

With the demise of the Neighbourhood Plan and the likely significantly increased housing allocation for Haddenham in the emerging Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan a budget has been included to produce an updated plan. It is anticipated that this will require professional help and the budget has been set accordingly. Any new referendum has to be funded by the District Council.

In common with other small businesses, the PC also has to fund pensions for its employees in the coming year.

All these additional pressures and responsibilities that have come to the Parish Council have meant that the precept for 2016/17 has been increased to £302,520. This equates to an increase of £1.20 per week for a household in band D. The increase is from a low base after many years of low or nil rises, and brings us into line with the other larger parishes in the area. The Parish Council constantly endeavours to find alternative sources of funding to supplement the precept for major projects such as the £86,000 grant from AVDC's New Homes Bonus for a new zebra crossing on Woodways.

Update on Sheerstock Parking - News from the LAF

In the last edition of the Village News, we announced that the funding for the parking feasibility study had been agreed by Bucks County Council's Local Area Forum (LAF). No sooner had the News hit the doormats than BCC advised that it had frozen all remaining LAF funding in 2015/16 to keep within spending limits. So the feasibility study has been put on hold. The PC has made strong representations to the LAF for the feasibility study to be re-considered in the new financial year. Let's hope our next edition has better news.

Accident at Clays Corner cross roads

Unfortunately, there has been another serious incident at the Clays Cross junction (as reported on Haddenham.net) when a young motor cyclist travelling along Stanbridge Road hit a car travelling along Woodways having apparently missed the signs to give way.

The residents from houses around this junction are naturally concerned and came to express their views at the Parish Council meeting in February. The PC is not responsible for the highways, so we have made representations to Buckinghamshire County Council. BCC have acknowledged the concerns but advises that any alterations at this junction have a low priority and are unlikely to be funded in the foreseeable future.

The PC has suggested to BCC the possibility of a solar-powered warning sign as a considerably cheaper alternative to an expensive mains-powered sign on Stanbridge Road when approaching the junction from the north.

BCC would support this if the funding of around £5000 could be found. The PC would be pleased to hear from village organisations which might be able to contribute to see if we can make this happen as a community initiative.

Open for Business

We are delighted to report that two key community assets have re-opened for business and appear to be doing a lively trade. The Rising Sun has new licencees and is now a comfortable family pub with a strong emphasis on good beer. At the other end of the village the Green Dragon has re-opened as a gastro pub providing an interesting menu as well as a seating area around the bar for people looking for a drink. Both would welcome your custom, as indeed would the Rose and Thistle (affectionately known as the Rat) on Station Road, and the Kings Head on the High Street. Supporting these local businesses helps our village community thrive.

Did you know that all Parish Council Meetings are open to the public? Most meetings have at least 15 minutes allocated for public participation and this is an opportunity for any member of the community to raise matters of concern, comments on the agenda items or to recognise some for the work going on in the village. In future years the fruit from the orchard will be free to anyone from our community. The peaceful captivating nature of the orchard will be enhanced by wildflower areas and fruit bushes.


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Know Your Councillors: Tom Newton
