
Haddenham Parking Opinion Survey

Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB) have now completed the recent opinion survey about parking on roads near to Haddenham and Thame Parkway Station. This survey forms the start of a scheme jointly funded by the LAF and Haddenham Parish Council to introduce parking restrictions. TfB reported the preliminary results back to the Bucks County Council Local Area Forum on 10th November.

The opinion survey ran from 14th October to 4th November, and comprised of a letter drop to over 850 addresses between the Station and Fort End and Townside. The survey extents area was determined and agreed between the Parish Council and TfB.

The Survey Monkey questions were based on TFB Parking team's current standard format for such surveys, with the primary aim to gauge the opinion of residents *(and businesses)*, on the parking issues present in their street.

Of the 850 letters sent out 390 completed questionnaires were completed online making an overall response rate of 46%. (*These figures may change once the full analysis is completed*). This is considered a good response and provides confidence that the responses can be used to inform the decision making process.





Planning Update

Haddenham Parking Opinion Survey

Summary of widely provided respondee comments / issues from the opinion survey

The overall response to the question about parking problems showed 62% saying there was a parking problem, 19% did not and 19% unsure.

Of those responding, 65% indicated the problem was junction protection issues, 13% had problems parking and 21% indicated it was other problems.

The main problem times according to those who responded were during the morning and afternoon weekdays *(68% of those responding)*, 24% indicated there was a problem in the evening, 16% had problems at the weekend and 34% said the problem was all the time.

Of those responding, 57% indicated they would support in principle some form of parking controls being introduced.

There was also the opportunity to make comments and the main issues raised were inconsiderate and dangerous parking by commuters using the station and parking on-street, commuters parking on-street and using the 280 bus and Thame Road Business Unit.

Concern was also voiced about the potential for displacement parking problems if restrictions introduced elsewhere.

There were also calls for Chiltern Railways to reduce their car park charges and also for them to fund a free resident parking scheme for residents.

TFB Comments

The results of the consultation overall and from individual streets is better than the national average for this sort of consultation. As such, the information provided can be used to inform the decision making process.

The results clearly indicate that the primary problems are access and junction protection and a scheme developed along these lines would benefit the area and are likely to be supported by local residents.

What happens next

The detailed analysis will be completed in time for the project team meeting in late November with Councillors, the Parish Council and TFB. Following this meeting, the results of the consultation will be reported and decisions agreed on the proposed design solutions and their location and an indicative timetable for further consultation. Chiltern Railways have agreed to contribute towards the cost of implementation.

PC gets voice at House of Commons on neighbourhood planning

On 12th October Cllr David Truesdale was invited to attend a meeting of the All Party Parliamentary Local Democracy Group at the House of Commons to speak at a session on Neighbourhood Planning. The meeting was also addressed by Gavin Barwell MP (Housing & Planning Minister), and by Lord Matthew Taylor (Lib Dem peer with special interest in housing & planning). The session was organised jointly with the National Association of Local Councils (NALC – a body which represents parish & town councils).

David was given 10 minutes to speak on our experience of neighbourhood planning in Haddenham, and he proposed 12 recommendations for reform. Planning Update

DAF Trucks to relocate to Haddenham

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome representatives from DAF Trucks UK to give a short presentation to the Planning Committee at its October meeting. DAF presented their plans to relocate their Thame offices and training centre to Haddenham Business Park.

Ray Ashworth (*Managing Director*) explained that the lease on the current site in Thame will expire in July 2018 and as the existing building is over 30 years old and no longer fits the company's requirements the decision was made to relocate. The opportunity to purchase the site (*currently 'plot w' on the outline planning application for the Airfield site*) at Haddenham Business Park was seen as the perfect location to build a prestigious new head office at the entrance to the business area.

DAF's main UK manufacturing site is in Lancashire, in fact they are the only company to manufacture trucks in the UK. The Thame site currently employs around 200 people in the head office and training centre and these staff will relocate to Haddenham, no expansion of the business is currently planned.

Work is in progress to design the new building and an artist's impression of an L-shaped building with a central atrium, one wing for offices and another for a training centre was shown to illustrate the aspirations of what could be built. A planning application is currently being worked up to submit to AVDC in the coming weeks. There will be a single access off Pegasus Way and structural planting around the site will be maintained as a buffer to the new housing. There will be around 170 car parking spaces and vehicles will be able to drive onto the site before reaching any barriers / security.

Once a detailed planning application is submitted the Parish Council will be notified by AVDC and given the opportunity to comment so it is useful at this early stage in the process to have the opportunity to give feedback on the plans. This also helps DAF to build a positive relationship with the community from the start.

Haddenham Community Library

Haddenham Community Library held its annual open meeting on 11th October, which was well attended by library customers, volunteers and sponsors. Chairman Steve Sharp reported on the past year and prospects for the future. The full text of his speech is available on the library website www.haddenhamcommunitylibrary.org.uk and at www.haddenham.net

After describing the ongoing partnership with the County Council, and paying tribute to staff, volunteers and sponsors, he set out the impact present and future - of the County Council's financial position in which from this year it loses all government grant. He also praised the partnership with Haddenham Screen which has provided a valuable village service and extra funds for the library.

The community library has built up some reserves, as required by the Charity Commission, which will shield it to some extent against loss of income from the County Council, including that currently received from hosting the Haddenham Children' Centre. Further savings from library services across the county are being planned for the next four years.

Despite these pressures, the library is planning to meet increased community demands for services and facilities by refurbishing and expanding the building. Rectory Homes has given pro bono support in developing architectural sketches. It is expected that in the next few months an appeal will be launched to fund these developments.

Haddenham Community Library is organising a raffle for two Christmas hampers - one for adults and one for children under 12, to raise funds for the library to continue providing a service to the community.

The adult hamper contains all you need for Christmas, including a voucher for a turkey, Champagne, wine, Christmas cake, Christmas pudding and much much more. The children's hamper includes vouchers (e.g. The Works, Cotswold Wildlife Park, The Entertainer), games, DVDs, books and much much more.

Tickets for £1 or £5 a book are on sale in the library and you don't need a library ticket to buy them. The draw will be made at the library at 4pm on December 16th.Children under 16 are not allowed to buy raffle tickets - but their parents and grandparents are!

Tributes to Dr. Handfield-Jones

Many older members of the Haddenham community will recall Dr Philip Handfield-Jones, the local GP for many years. We are very saddened to report his recent passing. Below, retired GP Dr Hugh Stradling offers some thoughts and memories of his former colleague.



In memory of a remarkable village doctor . . . Dr Philip Handfield-Jones MRCP, FRCGP

Philip was the son of an eminent surgeon in London, Ronald Montague Handfield-Jones and Elizabeth Merriman Handfield-Jones, an anaesthetist in Oxford. He followed his parents into medicine and after a short time (1947) as a lieutenant in the Royal Army Medical Corps (1), entered General Practice in Haddenham in the early 1950s. Whilst awaiting a suitable house to become available in Churchway, he was based at the Red Lion pub at Churchend for a short period. He initiated the building of the health centre by the library (now used as a fitness gym) as the practice grew and space for a partner was needed.

He was a very astute physician who was well loved by patients and colleagues alike. He was involved in many differing roles in the medical world with particular interests in General practice obstetrics and the training of new general practitioners (2). There are quite a number of publications, authored and coauthored by him in these two areas. He was also one of the fifty founder members of the Royal College of GPs.

I was privileged to be his first trainee and to discover not only his wealth of knowledge but also his amazing ability to encourage and enable a person to develop. He has remained an inspiration to me ever since.

He was very interested in village life and I remember him giving talks and showing a film about his forerunner, Dr Patterson and other village notables. There is also a recording of his interviews of the oldest Haddenham resident reproduced in "The Haddenham Chronicles No.4".

He was a singer and regularly sang with the choir at Ashfold school where he was also the school doctor. I also had the privilege of accompanying him at occasional musical evenings too. He loved sailing and used to rent a boat for holidays, sailing around the south coast. And his bee keeping!!

Soon after his arrival in Haddenham he married Heather who was also to become a very important person in the village as one of the founder members of the Fish Scheme. On his retirement after 31 years in the village, he and Heather moved to Cornwall where he bought a yacht for summer sailing and a lathe for wood turning in the winter!

He was a man of many parts, the like of whom we rarely see. He will be greatly missed by all who had the privilege of knowing him. Dr Hugh Stradling

The Haddenham practice was considered the best in the Aylesbury Vale region when I joined it and remained so until Philip's retirement and due to his example I think for many years it still remained one of the best. Future of local govt in Bucks

How many local authorities for Bucks in future? County Council argues one would be best.

The County Council has published a business case for replacing the present five councils *(one County and four District)* with one unitary authority for the whole county area. Senior officers are visiting parish councils to explain the proposals and on 26 September Sarah Ashmead *(Director, Strategy and Policy)* attended Haddenham's Finance and General Purposes Committee meeting. Part of the background is that government funding for Bucks, which in 2010 was £88 million will reduce to zero by 2020. Other important factors are the need for 50,000 new homes in Bucks and increases in the number of people over 65.

The County Council believes that change it is proposing would save some £18 million per year. Transition costs would be paid from reserves and be repaid over three years.

The total number of councillors would be reduced from 238 to 98, with clear accountability for services. Town and parish councils would have a larger role. There would be five local area planning committees and nineteen 'community boards' including parish councillors and representatives of other local bodies.

The proposals are being forwarded to the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) for a decision in January. Aylesbury Vale District Council are also producing a case for a single authority in Aylesbury Vale.

Beware of Scams

A warning from the County Council Please be aware, there are rogue traders about who particularly prey on the elderly and vulnerable. The work of Buckinghamshire and Surrey Joint Trading Standards have so far this year led to savings of £575,000 for elderly and vulnerable residents.

The service is having to deal with increasingly serious cases and a number have gone to court and the victims have been awarded compensation. However, it is a long process and puts the victim under a great deal of stress, so please be very careful when you agree to any work being done. These traders will knock on your door and tell you your roof needs retiling or will help you in the garden and many other ruses, so please only give work to people you know or have initiated contact with. Be very aware because they do target the elderly who may be lonely and vulnerable. If you do have concerns about a trader please report to Trading Standards at Bucks County Council by phoning 01296 395000.

Zebra crossing: Use for your safety!

Using the Woodways zebra crossing is vital for yours and your children's safety. Installed in July this year with efforts made by Transport for Bucks to maintain traffic and pedestrian movements through this very busy part of the village, sadly there was an accident at 8 am on Tuesday 20th September, where a boy was hit by a car on Woodways and taken to the John Radcliffe Hospital. Thankfully, his injuries weren't reported to be serious.

The zebra crossing follows months of campaigning by parents of the Haddenham Community Infant and Junior Schools, and affects not only children and their parents/carers, but also senior citizens as they attend events and activities at the Youth & Community Centre.

Please always use the crossing and drive carefully around Haddenham!

Haddenham smartens up its noticeboards

We are replacing our parish council noticeboard and installing some new community noticeboards opposite the library, the post office and one other location to be confirmed. Funded with contributions from The Rotary Club and the Community Library, other organisations including U3A, Age Concern and Haddenham Screen are also interested in using these noticeboards for promotion. The Parish Council manages its official noticeboard by the library, but the other noticeboards will be managed by volunteers.

BMX track gets a make over

Over the last few years the BMX track at Woodways playing field has progressively deteriorated into a narrow track, where in places you can only get 1 bike past the weeds and undergrowth (*x2 bikes width should be the minimum aim*).

Local resident Jason Bond who is a very keen cyclist raised his concerns with the Parish Council about the condition of the track which he says provides a key learning zone for kids, teens, and much bigger kids, and which should be given a much higher priority than it currently seems to have. We are in an ever growing population in Haddenham, so safe cycling within the bounds of the Village is becoming more and more tricky and a facility like this helps to build confidence in youngsters before they are let loose on the road. It was agreed that with support from the Parish Council Jason would get together a team of volunteers to restore the track back to its former good condition.

The managers of 2Wheels bike shop & Thame Skate/BMX park heroes James Dyroff & Ed Nixey are also on board with the project, having spent much of their teens fund raising for the amazing facilities that can now be found in our neighbouring town. These guys have bucket loads of experience & knowledge to offer the Haddenham BMX Track project and also mentioned that a few years back Haddenham had a very healthy BMX scene. In addition a member of the Haddenham High Flyers (*Tim Chowns*), a BMX stunt group from the 1980s has also been in touch to show their support for the project as it was their campaigning that resulted in the installation of the track all those years ago.

Work started in August with phase one which involved the volunteers hiring a flail mower to start clearing the over grown grass. Once this was done the Parish Council arranged for a professional weed killing service to spray the track in order to restore the edges. The final phase will be to carry out the restoration of the track to its original width and tidy up the area, expected to take place before or early in the Spring 2017.

The project has been publicised in the local schools and through a Facebook page 'Haddenham BMX - Save our Track' as we are keen to get people involved in the restoration project and then out using the track.
